Blocks & toys

Playing with blocks and other stackable toys develops both fine and gross motor skills, as well as spatial awareness. Use blocks to teach math concepts like height, width, and patterns.

- Access lessons on patterns and positional words inside our app. In the Library, find the “Logic+” and “123” tabs.
- As you are building a tower, ask questions like, “Whose tower is taller?”
- Use blocks to measure: “How many blocks tall are you?”

Reading & listening

When children listen to a book, they are building language development and pre-reading skills. Children learn how a book “works,” pick up new vocabulary, and pick up on patterns of cadence and tone.

- Access literacy lessons inside our app. Go to the Library and find the “Books” tab. Use the “Read to Me” function so your child can follow along.
- Read in different contexts. Model reading in the real world with things like street signs and recipes.

Sensory exploration

Play with sand, foam, water, or cloud-dough to build sensory awareness. Children will connect the way they feel to what’s happening around them, leading to appropriate behavioral choices and self-advocacy skills.

- Explore the senses of sound and movement in our app. Go to the Logic+ tab, where you’ll find music from Super Simple Songs®.
- Allow your child to try things, even if you know they won’t work. It’s all about trial + error!

Imaginary play

When children engage in imaginary play, they are using a complex set of skills to determine the rules of the world they’ve created, and to organize their thoughts into speech.

- Make up stories inside our app. Go to the Library and find the “Create” tab.
- There are literary elements in imaginary play! Children make stories with characters, plotlines, and settings.
- Ask questions like, “Why did you choose that costume?”

Arts & crafts

Creating art means that children are visualizing an image and bringing it to life! Children use fine motor skills to move writing utensils, spatial awareness to understand the boundaries of the page, and critical thinking to see how colors interact.

- Staple papers together so that it looks like a book! Your child can learn the parts of a book by making their own.
- Make a mailbox together! Now you can write letters back and forth with your child.

Helping at home

Asking your child to help with age-appropriate household tasks builds self-confidence. It can take longer to complete these tasks, but it’s a great time to weave in academic skills and exercise gross motor coordination.

- Slow down and treat these tasks as an education experience.
- Choose tasks that are developmentally appropriate. 2 y/o can put toys in a bin, 3 y/o can sort laundry, and 4 y/o can put away dishes.
